



COVID PROTOCOLS AND SAFETY

We cannot stress enough that the safety and well-being of our players, coaches, volunteers, and families is of utmost importance. This section details several AHS guidelines and resources and should give confidence that Glenlake will have a focused effort on working with all stakeholders to ensure a healthy and safe environment for hockey programming.

Contact Tracing and Symptom Screening

- Symptom Screening – _every participant is to use the [Alberta Health Daily Checklist](#). Members are required go through this checklist at home prior to coming to a scheduled activity. They are not required to prove completion. If a participant can answer YES to any of the questions, they are not to attend.
- Contact Tracing – _Prior to attending a scheduled event, participants will be required to complete the TeamSnap Health Check found within the Teamsnap App and provide proof of completion prior to being permitted onto the ice. Coaches and/or Managers will be responsible for ensuring availability is completed.

As per Government of Albert and AHS guidelines all sports programs are required to all participants and interactions, maintaining records in a secure location for 14 days from completion of activity. This is to be done as part of a daily check-in procedure for participants.

Glenlake, will be using TeamSnap’s "Health Check", within the TeamSnap App. Please review the following for instructions as to how to use the "Health Check"

Essentially, the Health Check is a short questionnaire that is tied to every event in TeamSnap for a particular team. When a parent goes into a TeamSnap event to provide their availability, they will be prompted to fill out the health check. Parents will be required to fill out their child's availability prior to every event, and if the child is attending, they MUST fill out the Health Check. If the child is not attending, they should not fill out the Health Check. Please note that the Health Check questionnaire will only open for input inside 8 hours of the scheduled event. This follows AHS requirement of the symptom screen to be filled out the day of the event. **Players will not be allowed on the ice if the health check is not completed.**

Anyone who is sick or has been in contact with someone who has COVID-19 is not permitted to attend practices or games. Familiarize yourself with the symptoms of COVID-19 and follow AHS and Government guidelines if you are not feeling well. **DO NOT ATTEND HOCKEY ACTIVITIES IF YOU ARE SICK.**

Positive COVID-19 Test in Hockey Environment

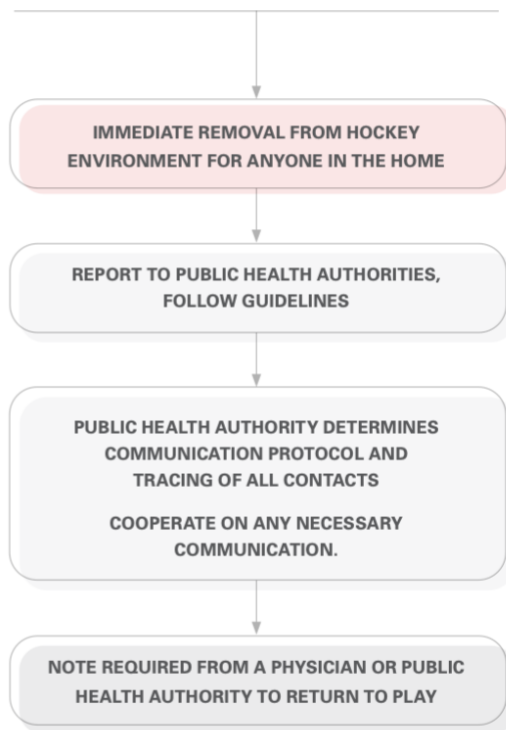
Important!

If a sick participant (or their parent/guardian if the participant is a minor) elects to inform a team/hockey association/Member that they have been diagnosed with COVID-19, the individual informed shall seek the sick participant/their parent's/guardian's consent to contact public health authorities in order to obtain advice on communication with other potentially impacted participants. The sick participant (or their parent/guardian if the participant is a minor) should be asked to advise Public Health of this consent.

Explain the communication that will take place and **NEVER** disclose the sick person's name.
